My Home: Rent	Community Residence	Person living in an apt where they entered into an agreement that is NOT covered by Ohio tenant landlord law. Rules in program or service agreement attached to housing. Refers to financial sponsorship and/or provision of some degree of on-site supervision for residents living in an apartment dwelling. Usually Board or agency owned. Treatment services are billed separately.	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> ▪ Service Enriched Housing ▪ Apartments with non-clinical staff attached ▪ SAMI housing- no alcohol on site ▪ Supervised Apartments
	Subsidized Housing	Person living in an apt where they entered into a lease in accordance to Ohio tenant landlord law and, in instances where ODMH allocated funds have been used, an exit strategy for the subsidy has been developed. Treatment services are billed separately.	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> ▪ Home-Ownership ▪ HAP ▪ Housing as Housing ▪ Person living in rental unit subsidized by state or Board funds ▪ Type IV –not licensed
			Refers to house, apartment or room which the client rents, which is not sponsored, licensed, supervised or otherwise connected to mental health system. Client is head of household or living in a natural family environment.
My Home: Own		Refers to house, apartment or room which the client owns or rents, which is not sponsored, licensed, supervised or otherwise connected to mental health system. Client is head of household or living in a natural family environment.	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> ▪ “Own Home” ▪ Person with Section 8 voucher ▪ Child living with family ▪ Adult w/roommate with shared household expenses. ▪ Home owner
Residential/Treatment Facility: Hospital		Refers to any non state operated hospital, including a private psychiatric hospital or the psychiatric division of a general medical facility	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> ▪ Private Psychiatric hospital ▪ Psychiatric Unit
Residential/Treatment Facility: Residential Care	Residential Care	Includes room and board, and personal care 24/7 if specified in license. Rules in program or service agreement attached to housing are applicable. Treatment services are billed separately. Licensed by the State. Usually agency operated and staffed; provides 24-hour supervision in active treatment oriented or structured environment.	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> ▪ Adult Care Facilities ▪ Licensed as Type I, II or III ▪ Buckeye Boys Ranch-Comprehensive tx ▪ Residential care facility ▪ Residential support ▪ ½ way house ▪ Group home ▪ Supervised Group Living ▪ Lodges ▪ Boarding Home ▪ Rest Home

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Residential/Treatment Facility: Temporary Housing	Temporary Housing	Non-hospital, time limited residential program with an expected length of occupancy and goals to transition to permanent housing. Includes room and board, with referral and access to treatment services that are billed separately. Ohio tenant landlord law does NOT cover agreement.	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> ▪ Commonly referred to as time limited, short term living. ▪ Transitional Housing Programs ▪ Homeless county residence currently receiving services ▪ Persons waiting for housing
Residential/Treatment Facility: Nursing Home		Refers to nursing home licensed by Ohio Department of Health with the provision of skilled or intermediate nursing care.	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> ▪ Intermediate Care Facility ▪ Skilled Nursing Facility
Other: Homeless living w/friend		Person who resides with others but does not have official residence (doubled up)	
Other: Homeless in shelter/no residence		Persons with no residence and those who reside in shelters which provide overnight lodging for homeless persons	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> ▪ Homeless shelter ▪ Person residing under bridge ▪ Domestic Violence
Other: Friend's Home		Refers to house, apartment or other living situation in which the client lives with a friend who is head of household	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> ▪
Other: Relative's/Guardian Home		Refers to house, apartment, or other living situation in which the client lives with a relative who is head of household.	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> ▪ Adult living with parents or family member
Other: Respite Care	Respite Care	Short-term living environment, it may or may not be 24-hour care. Reasons for this type of care are more environmental in nature. May provide supervision, services and accommodations. Treatment services are billed separately.	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> ▪ Placement during absence of another caretaker where client usually resides ▪ Respite Care
Other: Foster Care	Foster Care	Living situations in which the (child or adult) client resides with a non-related family or person in that person's home for purpose of receiving care, supervision, assistance and accommodations. Treatment services are billed separately. Licensed through State.	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> ▪ Child Foster Care ▪ Adult Foster Care
Other: Jail/Prison		Refers to any facility operated by city, county, or state law enforcement providers	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> ▪ County Jail ▪ Correctional ½ way house ▪ Workhouse ▪ Prison
N/A**	Crisis Care	Provision of short-term care to stabilize person experiencing psychiatric emergency. Offered as an alternative to inpatient psychiatric unit. Staff 24 hours' day/7 days a week. Treatment services are billed separately.	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> ▪ Crisis Bed ▪ Crisis Residential

** While a client might be in crisis care when seen by a clinician, crisis care is temporary and not a true living situation. The best approach would be to identify the more "permanent" living situation (or homeless) and note that the client is currently in a crisis care situation as well.
